

## **The Competition Rules for the BALTIC ORIENTEERING CHAMPIONSHIPS 2020-2025**

### **1. General**

- 1.1. The Baltic Orienteering Championships in foot orienteering (BOC) is the official event to award the titles of the Baltic Champions in foot orienteering.
- 1.2. BOC is organized by the appointed Federation:  
2020 – Lithuanian Orienteering Federation,  
2021 – Latvian Orienteering Federation.  
2022 – Estonian Orienteering Federation,  
2023 – Lithuanian Orienteering Federation,  
2024 – Latvian Orienteering Federation,  
2025 – Estonian Orienteering Federation.
- 1.3. The BOC official program consists of a long distance competition (in case of very good terrain organizer can offer middle distance for M/W 21 however for juniors should be long distance) and a relay.
- 1.4. The organizing federation must enter the long (or middle) distance competition as World Ranking Event.
- 1.5. Competition rules for IOF foot orienteering events shall be applied at the BOC.
- 1.6. Additional regulations which do not conflict with these rules and Competition rules for IOF Foot orienteering events may be proposed by the organizer. The additional regulations need prior approval of the Lithuanian, Estonian, Latvian, Belarus and Saint Petersburg Orienteering Federations.

### **2. Participating federations**

Latvia, Estonia, Lithuania, Belarus, Saint Petersburg

### **3. Classes**

- 3.1. Individual long distance competition:  
W14, W16, W18, W20, W21  
M14, M16, M18, M20, M21
- 3.2. Relay:  
W16, W20, W21  
M16, M20, M21

### **4. Participation**

- 4.1. Each competitor shall have full citizenship of the country that he or she represents.
- 4.2. Each federation may enter a team of up to 56 competitors – up to 28 women and 28 men – and up to 5 officials of the team. The maximum number of members in each class is determined as follows:

- 4.3. Each federation may enter up to 2 non-team competitors in classes W21 and M21, with the exception of the organizing federation that may enter up to 4 non-team competitors in both classes. Non-team runners should be entered on a national team entry form, and they should be separately marked as non-team runners.

4.4. It is allowed to have in the team up to 6 individual runners altogether in groups MW16, 18, 20 but not more than 2 individual runners in one group. Individual runners in youth and junior groups cannot participate in relay.

4.5. In the individual long distance competition classes W20 and M20 shall not compete on the same courses for classes W21 and M21 respectively.

4.6. In the relay, each federation may enter up to 3 teams in every class. In addition in classes W21 and M21, each federation may enter one more team of non-team runners. Each relay team shall consist of 3 members.

4.7. If a federation is unable to make up complete relay teams, it may form incomplete teams or mixed teams with runners from other federations.

## **5. BOC dates and program**

5.1. BOC shall be held in May or in the beginning of June. The event dates are suggested by the organizing federation and approved by other participating federations.

Arrival and accreditation

Model event

*Saturday*

Opening ceremony

Individual long (or middle) distance competition

Prize-giving ceremony (long distance)

Social events

Team official's meeting

*Sunday*

Relay competition

Prize-giving ceremony (relay)

## **6. Information about BOC**

6.1. Information from the organizer shall be given in the form of bulletins.

6.2. Bulletin 1 (preliminary information) shall include the following information:

- Organizing club(s) and the names of the event director and controller
- Postal address, telephone number, e-mail address and web page for information
- Dates of competition
- Venue
- A color copy of the most recent version of any previous orienteering map(s) of the competition area(s).

6.3. Bulletin 2 (invitation) shall include the following information:

- All information given in bulletin 1
- Official entry and accommodation forms
- Types and cost of accommodation and food service
- Opportunities for training
- Description of terrain
- Scales and vertical contour intervals of the maps
- Event program
- Winning time and approximate length of each course
- Latest date for all type entries and reservations
- Latest date and address for the payments
- Arriving scheme

6.4. Bulletin 3 (additional event information) shall be given on arrival of the competitors and shall include the final details of the event information.

6.5. Bulletin 1 shall be published in December of the year prior to BOC. Bulletin 2 shall be published 2 months before the event.

## **7. Costs**

7.1. Team entry fee is 900 EUR (full team 46-56 runners), 700 EUR (less than 45 runners). The entry fee includes:

- Participation in the competitions and the model event
- Start and result lists (3 copies per federation)
- Free parking at the competition arenas

7.2. The rental payment of electronic control card for one competitor is 1 Euro per two days.

7.3. Accommodation and food service should be arranged by the organizer. The costs of accommodation and food service shall be kept as low as possible.

7.4. Late entries may be charged an additional fee.

## **8. Punching system**

The IOF approved electronic punching system must be used.

## **9. Starting order**

9.1. The start draw for the individual long distance competition will be made by WRE rules.

Best competitors start at the end.

9.2. The start interval in the long distance competition could be 3 minutes or less. In latter case some kind of forking system (like “butterfly”) has to be used.

## **10. Team score**

10.1. Team score is calculated for each federation by counting up points as follows:

10.2. An overall team score is calculated for each federation as the total sum of points achieved in long distance and relay.

10.3 In the case of tie sum the final placement will be determined using the following criteria in order of priority:

- 1) sum of points achieved in relay;
- 2) count of 1st places both in long distance and relay;
- 3) count of 2nd places both in long distance and relay;
- 4) count of 3rd places both in long distance and relay;
- 5) etc.

## **11. Prizes**

11.1. In the long distance competition the first three competitors of each class are awarded medals and certificates, also prizes are presented to the winners of each class.

11.2. In the relay, each individual member of the team receives the appropriate medal and certificate.

11.3. The best team according to the team score results receives the cup.

11.4. All prizes, medals, certificates and the cup must be provided by the organizer.

## **12. Jury**

12.1. The jury consists of 5 voting members by one of each participating federation. The event controller leads the jury but has no vote.

12.2. Decisions of the jury are final.

## **13. Public events**

13.1. The Baltic Masters Orienteering Championship or other public events may be held together with BOC by the decision of organizers.
